# IN SUPPORT OF QUALITY, AFFORDABLE HEALTHCARE

WHEREAS the past 10 years have witnessed spiking national healthcare costs at an average 11% per year, and

WHEREAS both current and future retirees are concerned about both the availability

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and affordability of healthcare in their futures, therefore BE IT RESOLVED that the Ohio Federation of Teachers encourages and supports

SERS and STRS Ohio in seeking an on-going option of quality and affordable

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WHEREAS the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio (STRS) was created by the Ohio General Assembly in 1919, in order provide financial security through a pension for Ohio's public educators, and

RESOLUTION OPPOSING CONSOLIDATION OF FIVE STATE PENSIONS

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WHEREAS the STRS Ohio has sustained itself for ninety-two years as it has continued to provide for additional needs of retired teachers, and

WHEREAS recent comments by elected officials on the state level have suggested a need to consolidate STRS with the four other state pensions, but

WHEREAS each of the other four State of Ohio pension organizations serve completely different career professionals with significantly different job descriptions, different compensations, and different contract issues, and

WHEREAS the concept of five pension organizations merged into one in a "one size fits all" system does not utilize common sense, but would lead to a reluctance to be fair when making decisions, and

WHEREAS a Board of Directors for a consolidated state pension organization would not only protect their own constituency but would also lack knowledge of personal concerns and problems of the other four pensions, and

WHEREAS in a consolidated pension, the governing body or Board of Directors would experience conflicts of issues when deciding for their pension of origin versus the good of five pensions, and

WHEREAS such a conflict of interest breeds gridlock, or certainly it challenges the ability to decide in the best interest of each pension, and

WHEREAS there is no evidence that pension consolidation would save money and run more efficiently, and

WHEREAS the Ohio state legislature that has taken over 17 years to defy four Ohio Supreme Court decisions, only to come up short for an equitable solution to funding public education in Ohio, and now wants to redesign the 5 state pensions, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Ohio Federation of Teachers proclaims formal opposition to pension consolidation, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Ohio Federation of Teachers lobby to support STRS Ohio and the other state pension organizations to remain independent in their current state, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that OFT partner with STRS Ohio to call upon the other four pensions: the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System, the School Employees Retirement System, the Ohio Police and Fire Pension, and the Ohio Highway Patrol Pension, to unite together in political action to oppose pension consolidation in Ohio.

# RESOLUTION TO OPPOSE THE RELEASE OF INFORMATION TO THE PUBLIC, REGARDING RETIRED MEMBERS OF OHIO'S PUBLIC PENSION SYSTEMS

WHEREAS the United States Constitution has upheld an individual's right to privacy, originally addressed in the third, fourth, and fifth amendments, and

WHEREAS recent requests for information by members of the press and by elected officials have called for a release of information regarding financial benefits of current retired members of the public pension systems, and

WHEREAS public pensions have refused to disclose this information, under the "right to privacy" of private citizens, but

WHEREAS the request for such information has positioned one's "right to know" against "one's right to privacy", and

WHEREAS although public pension recipients were public employees when they were employed, but

WHEREAS such individuals, now retired, are no longer considered public persons, and

WHEREAS employee and employer contributions have been invested over a period of time to earn the benefits paid to retired members, and

WHEREAS current practices of identity-theft continue to demonstrate the danger in which retired people are placed, and

WHEREAS whenever any of this information is made public, no matter if disguised, it targets the retired pensioner for criminal acts, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Ohio Federation of Teachers opposes any disclosure of information about retired members, of Ohio's public pension systems and furthermore

BE IT RESOLVED, that OFT calls upon Ohio's public pension systems to do everything in their power to keep such entities from receiving such information, and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that OFT calls upon the Ohio Attorney General Michael DeWine, to do his sworn duty and to protect the members of Ohio's public pension systems.

WHEREAS the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio Board of Directors revised its plan to achieve pension stability, and

WHEREAS current Ohio law requires a funding period of no more than 30 years for any public pension, and

WHEREAS the STRS Ohio's revised pension proposal now complies with current legislative mandates, but

WHEREAS the Ohio Federation of Teachers opposes the current link between service years and age in the revised pension proposal, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Ohio Federation of Teachers directs the OFT Executive Committee to monitor and propose adjustments as needed in order to facilitate the separation of service years and age, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that OFT officially requests that STRS be given the authority to restore lost benefits if and when its financial situation can adequately support their return.
